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

RABBI MISHKIN'S MESSAGE

The following is an abbreviated version of Rabbi Mishkin's Yizkor sermon for Shemini Atzeret 5785:

"Mourning, Meaning and Yizkor"


Many years ago, I was at my synagogue's cemetery in Sarasota, Florida, quietly awaiting an unveiling. It was a warm spring morning, as is often the case in Southwest Florida. The hu-



I looked across the way, to another section of our cemetery, and I noticed a young man standing by a grave. For many minutes he stood there, not moving, seemingly lost in thought. He was also casually dressed in shorts and a polo shirt, alone, hands stuffed in his pockets. There was a gentle breeze that was blowing through the trees at the edge of the cemetery.

Then he moved. Almost suddenly it seemed to me. He leaned forward, reaching his hand toward the grave, appearing to rest it on the monument. From the distance I couldn't quite tell what he was doing, but I guessed he was placing stones on the grave, that old tradition that we Jews have whenever we visit our loved ones at the cemetery. Although in ancient times it was the way in which graves would be marked, today each of the stones is a symbol of permanence, of the way connections that are made by love cannot be broken and of how we carry memory in our hearts and souls.

And then, I will always remember what happened next because it was so unusual. He fell to his knees, bent his chest to the stone, and cradled the monument in his arms. He lowered his forehead to the cold metal plaque affixed atop the monument, touching the stone, the name inscribed there,

the ground, that physical place where his loved one lay, that one single place in this entire world where he felt that presence. It reminded me of the importance of laying our loved ones to rest and having the chance to visit them whenever we feel the need.

Perhaps he was imagining the other senses he might have engaged in that moment. Perhaps, the smell of an old cardigan, blouse or perfume wafting in the air for just a moment. Maybe the taste of a favorite recipe came to his tongue. Or the sound of laughter long not heard, or gentle words spoken long ago came into his ears. I then saw him speak to the stone, to the presence that he felt there. Too far away, I could not hear anything that he said, but I could imagine what he might have been saying.

It would be akin to what we must say whenever we visit the graves of our loved ones who are no longer with us, what we say each time we pause at, this most sacred of spaces — that I love you, I miss you, I think of you each and every day. I am doing my best, I am living my life, but it is not the same without you, nor will it ever be, and that is just how it is.

He stayed there for some time. Holding the stone with his arms, softly speaking. Time stood still. Finally he arose, slowly, almost reluctantly. It was time to go. Perhaps he had an appointment, or the kid's soccer game, or work, or a million other things called to him. It was life that was continuing – days that had to be, that should be lived with passion and purpose, and by doing that, he was continuing to honor the person who lay in that grave. Finally, he put his hands on his hips and wiped at his eyes. His heart was heavy. Grief comes back so easily and so suddenly; it lies just under the surface, and we always find it at the cemeteries we visit.

My hope is always that we can also find peace when we visit the graves of our loved ones. And gratitude. Perhaps we also can find some peace here in our serene sanctuary at this time of Yizkor, in knowing that we honor those who lived life well, and who left for us a legacy that we carry to this day, a legacy that brings meaning, guidance and purpose to our lives. Gratitude that we were blessed with love, that we were cared for, cherished, nourished and sustained by these individuals whose presence we still feel, but whose voices we only now hear in our minds and our hearts. That they gave us so much, so generously, and that we, in turn, did our best to give to them in the time that we shared, in the life that we made together.

There is a poignant Midrash that compares the final festival of Shemini Atzeret to a King who joy-fully hosts all of his children for a party lasting several days and then, when the last day finally arrives, he comes to them and pleads with them, please stay with me for just one more day because "your parting is so very difficult for Me." This is the classic understanding of that Midrash.

However, I would like to offer a different interpretation. You see in this Midrash, what bothers God is not our parting from God; for obviously God will continue to be with us, to be by our sides. What bothers God is the fact that we are now separating from the time that we have had together — that for the last month or so, we have spent so much quality time together in our synagogue home, thinking about the things that really matter to our lives, not the silly stuff, but the real stuff, and by doing that we become keenly aware of our mortality and of the fragile and temporal nature of the human experience. And it is inevitable that as we do that, we also think about those who are no longer with us far more frequently during this time of year than at other times of the year.

But, my friends, here is the good news for us to consider - we don't have to be separate from God or each other in this sanctuary for another twelve months. If we can find the time once in a while to return to this sacred home then we can continue to feel close to our God, to each other, and to all those who helped to touch and enrich our lives.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Good Yom Tov to our Congregants and Guests in the Temple and on Zoom! On behalf of the Board of Directors of the synagogue, I have been asked to make the Yizkor appeal today.

I am now in my second year as your President as I started my second term in June 2023. Previously I served as President from 2015 to 2017.

How are we doing financially?



The good news about our finances is that there is no long-term debt, and we have a lean budget. We supplement our Budget with rental income from our two tenants, who both signed new leases this summer with significant increases. As an aging congregation, we continue to lose members by death, but our membership stays constant with 100 families. Our building and parsonage are getting older. Recently in our building, we had a major plumbing repair, replaced the air conditioning unit downstairs, and installed a new sound system in the sanctuary and social hall. We also completely remodeled one of the bathrooms in the parsonage due to plumbing issues. We used reserve funds to cover these repairs.

So, what can we all do for our Beth Ohr community?

To the guests who are celebrating the holidays with us, I hope you enjoyed our services and our friendship. I urge you to consider joining our Temple after the holidays. To the Adult children of our members who joined the Synagogue after my speech last year, thank you so much. You are helping to continue the legacy of Congregation Beth Ohr started by your parents and grandparents more than 67 years ago. If you are interested in membership, please reach out to any Board member or contact our office next week.

In my speeches and newsletter articles, I have pointed out that the Membership Chair position on the Temple Board is still open. I am disappointed that no one has stepped up during the 16 months of my Presidency. If you are interested, contact me after Yom Kippur.

The Covid pandemic has ended, and most of us have returned to our normal activities. We have Religious Services every Friday night on Zoom, which provides a sense of community to our home-bound members. We have more congregants attending Friday night services on Zoom than the weekly Saturday or Sunday morning services held in the Sanctuary. We need YOU to attend three more Shabbat morning services this coming year. It is wonderful seeing you here on the High Holidays, but the Synagogue is operating for your benefit 52 weeks a year.

Here are some insights on how your presence in the Synagogue strengthens our Jewish community and brings comfort to our members.

- 1. During the weekly Torah reading, Rabbi Mishkin reads the long Mishaberach list of those who are ill, followed by the Congregation singing the lovely Debbie Friedman "Mishaberach" tune. There is a comforting feeling when you attend services in the sanctuary and your loved one's name is recited over the Torah.
- 2. Following the Torah reading, we have two English readings. The first prayer is for our government and its leaders. We hope that our prayers will turn the hate, racism, and anti-Semitism in the United States back to civility and cooperation. The second prayer is for peace in the State of Israel where we say, "Then nation will not threaten nation and mankind will no longer know war". After the horrific attack of October 7, 2023, a large crowd attended Shabbat services in our Synagogue to pray for the hostages and survivors. Last Sunday I attended the Jewish Federation Program commemorating the attack on Israel a year ago. It was very moving to be in solidarity with 500 fellow Jews. There is strength when we gather as a community!
- 3. We are an egalitarian Synagogue and need to provide a quorum of ten men and women to make a minyan. We must comfort members who have lost loved ones and guarantee that they can recite the Mourners Kaddish. We will be saying Yizkor soon for our relatives, but you should come in person to say Kaddish for your loved one on his/her Yahrzeit. Remember that the Congregation was there for you at your time of need.

4. We provide two Shabbatons every year and special programs on select Sunday mornings during the year. Our volunteers work hard to provide these dinners and events which are always insightful and informative. Show your support to the volunteers who work hard to provide these events for you. Volunteer to help plan and prepare for these events – there is no job that is too small. WE NEED YOU. WE NEED EACH OTHER. Linda Benish, our Programming Chair, has provided a booklet which outlines our weekly educational classes and upcoming social programs. This was emailed to our members, and there are copies available at the front desk in the lobby.

We have a major fundraiser each year where we honor Synagogue leaders and distinguished members in the community. This event is scheduled for Sunday, October 27, 2024, at 11:00 AM. Plan to attend to honor our dear Rabbi Mishkin who just completed his 10th year as our religious leader, and congregants Cheryl and Lee Cadel, and Roberta Karpel.

We will soon recite the Yizkor Service after the Rabbi's sermon. I want to share with you some thoughts about a special relative.

On the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Rabbi Mishkin talked about what qualities outside of prayer make a Jewish person religious. My dear brother-in-law, George Kirschenbaum, passed away three years ago at the age of 73. George's life revolved around his family, his career, and his favorite sports teams. He was not a religious person - he attended Hebrew School, had a Bar Mitzvah, and went to shul on the High Holidays. George was a confident Manhattan labor lawyer who often traveled to North Carolina to represent poor union factory workers. After his retirement he volunteered with the Legal Aid Society to help those who could not afford a lawyer. He was very generous when donating money. He coached his son's sports teams and supported his daughter's dream to become a flutist in the Manhattan All City High School orchestra, where she made it to Carnegie Hall. He loved my sister during their 49 year marriage, and was looking forward to spending his retirement enjoying his two year old grandson. He was an enthusiastic fan of New York sports teams, the Rangers, the Knicks, the Jets, but most of all the New York /San Francisco Giants baseball team. As a lawyer he always won the argument with me that his hero Willie Mays was better than my hero, Mickey Mantle. George participated in a clinical trial at Mount Sinai hospital in Manhattan to assist in finding a cure for liver cancer. He was a man who performed acts of kindness throughout his entire life.

At this time, I ask you to remember a special relative and give a little more than you pledged last year in his or her memory. Once you turn over the tag on the pledge card, a Men's Club usher will collect your pledge envelope.

I would like to acknowledge our volunteers who made the High Holidays run so smoothly this year.

To our office manager Meryl Lafazan for coordinating the High Holiday preparation.

To the remaining Executive Board members and the Regular Board of the Temple, I acknowledge you for your efforts throughout the year, and thank you on behalf of the entire membership for your devotion to Beth Ohr. To the Ritual Committee for assigning all the High Holiday honors, and to the Lay Chazzanim, the Shofar Blowers, the Torah readers, Haftorah chanters and Gabbis.

To Sisterhood for providing the beautiful flowers on the Bimah, and the refreshments for breaking the fast later this evening.

To Men's Club, for changing the Torah covers and the curtains for the Ark, putting out the Machzors, ushering, building the Sukkah, and providing breakfast every Sunday morning.

To our wonderful, talented visiting Cantor, Zahava Fried, for enriching our lives with her lively tunes, her lovely soprano voice, and for inspiring each of us spiritually. We are thrilled about the upcoming birth of her third child in December and anxiously wait for the exciting news.

And to Rabbi Mishkin for leading our meaningful High Holiday services, for your wisdom and optimism, and for your spiritual leadership. We are all blessed to have you as our Rabbi! We look forward to you and Beverly spending several more years with us in Old Bridge.
