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# **OHR BITS**

The Rabbi's Corner by Rabbi Joel Mishkin

Attendance at services is always a problem. It is a particularly acute one for small synagogues such as ours. We increasingly find it difficult to gather a minyan on Sunday mornings and some Shabbatot are challenging as well. In light of this, I want to share some thoughts about one Jewish woman.

Her name is Jodi Rudoren. She is probably a Jew very much like you and me. She discovered that she had a problem. She was many weeks into reciting Kaddish, the traditional Jewish prayer of mourning for her father when she realized, to her dismay, that she did not know how to pray. Now, how could that be? She was familiar with the words and the melodies of the daily services. Her father made sure of that. He would bring her and her sisters to a conservative synagogue every Shabbat of their childhoods. She had attended a Hebrew speaking summer camp for seven years so she even knew what the prayers meant. In fact, she knew them well enough to take her place at her synagogue even leading the prayers on some Sunday mornings.

But then she discovered, "That I was clueless about God. How to talk to God, how to think about God, whether I believed in God, and what he - my father - had believed. I knew what the words of the ancient texts meant in English, but not what they meant to me."

Furthermore, Ms. Rudoren had always found the Jewish mourning rituals to be a powerful part of our tradition. The communal aspect of one such ritual spoke powerfully to her, the recitation of the Kaddish that required a minyan, (a quorum of ten Jews to fulfill its purpose). She found the daily commitment daunting but also appealing, a challenge and opportunity to everyone around her and to her dead father that the tradition did really matter to her.

"Kaddish was something I associated with Dad, whose booming voice, whenever he recited the prayer, still echoed in her head." She also noted that some of the loveliest memories people shared with her about her dad took place around this ritual in the days following his death. "How Dad made sure that prayer leaders did not go fast for newbies or drown out women. Or how Dad had reconciled with his own after decades of distance so he could say the Kaddish for him with less baggage."

It seemed that everything made sense except one thing, the prayer part. As she described it, "Kaddish may be the most famous Jewish prayer, infused into modern culture. Sylvester Stallone recited it in Rocky III. One of Allen Ginsberg's most famous poem shares its title. It dates back to the first century BCE, and its text does not mention death rather it is a paean to God's strength and sovereignty. Scholars interpret this prayer being used for mourning as a declaration of God's plan.

And so she struggled with this notion. She took it upon herself to recite it daily. However, spiritually it really wasn't doing much for her. She was okay focusing on her father while reciting the words of the Kaddish. It was the prayer part for the rest of the service - listening to the prayers when she found that her mind really wandered. She even remembered from Hebrew school learning about the concept of keva and savannah - words translated as routine or intention. "The idea is that if you chant the words every day, eventually moments of connection would come." She was still waiting for that moment.

Fortunately for Jodi one day she attended a study retreat in Maryland and went on a walk in the woods with Rabbi, Brent Chaim Spodeck. He called it a "soul stroll." He led a group on a light hike around a pond, stopping at beautiful spots to offer a few thoughts on the meaning of our familiar prayer book. And then she explained: "When we got to the central prayer - the 19 blessings known as the Amidah, Rabbi Spodeck summed it up as, "Wow! Please? Thank you." And that's where it happened - I learned how to pray on my own terms. Wow - shevach in Hebrew or praiseworthiness - is about God's awesomeness. Rabbi Spodeck said he spends a minute or two pondering the miracle that is creation. Please, bakashot or requests is where we ask for things. Let my friends' surgery go well. Help my kid find his footing. Make me listen more - not stuff - but hard things, big things, things that we really need. And Thank you - that's hodaot - like a gratitude journal - a wonderful breakfast - a talk with a friend - a walk in the woods.

It was hokey, but it worked and for the rest of her eleven months whenever her mind wandered she would just close the book, close her eyes, and try a little of: wow, please, thank you. Now it did not instantly transform her into a believer. She still struggles, especially on the wow part, finding herself wowing God for making humans who figured out some technological, athletic or artistic miracle. But she also discovered something now when she prays. There are plenty of pleases. And thanks, especially for the nine other Jews who showed up so she could say Kaddish for her Dad, no matter what he believed.

My biggest disappointments as President were:

- The decline in attendance at Saturday and Sunday morning services.
- The lack of attendance at our Programs and Education Classes.

I wish much success to our incoming President, Jeff Perlman, as he will be serving as President for the second time (Jeff was President from 2010-2012). The future of our Synagogue depends on our member's increasing their participation at Religious Services, Programs, Education Classes and supporting our Sisterhood and Men's Club. If things do not improve over the next three years, the Synagogue Executive Board will be forced to make difficult decisions.
